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

# Books and Bots: How to use Robots as a Tool for Teaching Early Math and Literacy Skills for PreK Students AJ Long, Claire Parker, Jill Strawder-Bubala, Rebecca Kufeld (Room 1)

To best support early literacy and school readiness and to build a foundation in computer science, science, technology, engineering, and math (CS-STEM) for PreK students, Nevada Robotics presents a unique and innovative program called Books and Bots that combines reading, math, and robots. Robots are educational tools that teach critical skills such as creativity, collaboration, verbal communication, and computational thinking, problem-solving; all competencies that are a part of how children become learners and build foundational literacy skills.

Partnering robotics education (a CS-STEM skill) with literacy and math is a perfect combination of what are widely considered to be the most critical subject areas for young students. Early learners will make literacy and math gains through hands-on CS-STEM lessons that use robots as a learning tool.

### Exploring the Power of Play: How our Interactions During Play can Promote Children's Thinking Bonnie Spencer (Room 2)

Together let's investigate the stages of play, why play in our classroom is important for student learning, and our role while interacting with students in their play. Come away with strategies to scaffold your questioning to extend children's thinking further and inspire high-quality interactions.

### Using N.E.A.R. Science to Understand the Impact of Trauma on the Developing Brain Veronica Chacon (Room 3)

Experiencing trauma during critical periods of brain development can significantly disrupt neural pathways, impairing cognitive functions, emotional regulation, and the formation of secure attachments. The enduring impact of such disruptions underscores the urgent need for a comprehensive understanding of the neurobiological consequences of trauma, guiding effective interventions to support healthy brain development in at-risk populations.

#### Interviewing, Hiring and Retaining like the Big Dogs Ronnie Armstrong & Barbie Prinster (Room 4)



#### Considering Yourself a "Mandated Supporter" Claire Louge (Main Ballroom)

You may be a mandated reporter, but could you consider yourself a mandated supporter, too? In this session, we'll discuss how we can protect children from adversity by connecting families to what they need. The strategies and techniques explored are rooted in the Strengthening Families™ Protective Factors Framework, an approach that recognizes when families have access to the supports needed to deal with life's stressors, children thrive.

#### Math Adventures: Dice and Card Delights for Preschoolers Amanda McPherson (Room 1)

Make learning math fun for preschoolers with these hands-on, minds-on activities. Participants will receive developmentally appropriate math lessons and the materials to implement the lessons in their classrooms. #### Adverse Childhood Experiences Policy and Program Review Erica Quintana (Room 4)

ADHS collaborated with the Morrison Institute for Public Policy to (1) identify ACEs that are challenges in Arizona (2) review policies and programs in the state related to those ACEs and (3) identify policies and programs in other states that aim to reduce or mitigate ACEs. This presentation will focus on highlighting the policies and programs identified for the top 6 ACEs that are challenging in Arizona: poverty, divorce, neighborhood violence, domestic violence, mental illness in families, and parental incarceration.

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#### Arizona Early Childhood Workforce Registry Training Log for non-verified Trainings


This feature of the Arizona Early Childhood Workforce Registry will allow Registry Users to document training hours from professional development taken outside of Registry enrollment.


- 1. Log into the Arizona Early Childhood Registry at www.azearlychildhood.org.
